#### Purpose:

- Provide tools to develop a congregational plan
- Provide preparedness resources
- Provide information on additional programs and resources





#### What is a disaster?

- ...an event beyond the control of the individuals affected resulting in great harm, suffering, destruction and damage.
- ...disrupts personal and community life...
- ...damages a community's ability to sustain life without outside assistance.





#### Natural Disasters

- Floods
- Windstorms
- Fires caused by lightning
- Tornadoes
- Earthquakes
- Hurricanes
- Snow and/or Ice storms





#### Human-caused Disasters

- Explosion
  - Collapse of a structure
    - Bridge, building, tunnel, dam
- Release of hazardous material
  - Industrial accident
  - Train derailment
  - Highway accident





#### Alabama Disaster History

- 45 Federally declared disasters since 1953
- Only 6 states have more declared disasters
- These disasters include
  - Hurricanes
  - Flooding
  - Tornadoes
  - Severe winter storms
  - Fires





#### Highest Alabama Risks

Listed in order of likelihood:

- Flooding
- Tornadoes / Windstorms
- Hurricanes
- Winter / Ice Storms
- Lightning





# What does it mean to be prepared?

- Recognize the risk
- Have a plan
- Share the plan with others





#### Levels of Preparedness

- Personal
  - Home, work, car
- Family / Household
- Congregational
  - Main focus of this training
- Community





#### **Personal Preparedness**

- Personal plan
- Emergency Contacts (ICE)
- Supplies
- Evacuation route and alternate





#### Family / Household Preparedness

- Family plan
- Emergency Contact Information
- Meeting place
- Supplies
- Assign duties / share tasks
- Share plan with others





#### **Congregational Preparedness**

- Develop a plan
- Help members prepare
- Create a contact list
- Prepare your facility





#### Develop a Plan

A disaster plan is a guide for your congregation to:

- Protect property
- Continue services
- Care for members
- Recover or repair disaster-related damages
- Communicate information





#### Help members prepare

- Provide resources for individual, family, and household disaster preparation
- Recognize that members will need to care for their family's immediate needs
- Develop local resource list
- Provide training





#### Create a Contact List

Develop and maintain a list of members

- Include emergency contact info
- Include probable evacuation location
- Identify special needs or those at-risk
- Develop a phone tree to contact members





#### **Prepare** Facility

Develop facility plan

- Prepare records for safe evacuation
  - Do you have backups?
- Develop checklist for facility
- Maintain
  - emergency lighting / exit signs
  - emergency supplies
  - Fire extinguishers, smoke detectors, alarms

#### Ways to become involved

- Become a Red Cross Shelter
- Utilize &/or expand existing ministries
- Organize self-supporting response teams
  - First Responder Teams
  - Pastoral Care Teams
  - Children/Teen's Programs
  - Other volunteer services (medical/legal/etc)
  - Work Teams (clean up / construction)





#### Establish Congregational Team/Task Force

Appoint a congregational disaster response coordinator
Utilize lay leadership
Provide training


